

Reflections: John 4:5-42



When God saved the Israelites from oppression, they passed through the waters of the sea into freedom. On their journey through the desert, the people were often thirsty. They complained that Moses had led them into the wilderness to die. In turn, Moses protested to God. "What am I going to do with this people?" Despite their grumbling, God was faithful. At the Lord's command, Moses struck a rock and water issued forth.

God's life-giving presence is not a dry cistern but a "fountain springing up from within." When Jesus met a despised Samaritan woman at a well, he revealed her inner need, not for ordinary water but for the living water of the Spirit. When her thirst was quenched by Jesus' words, she told others what she found. They came to know for themselves that Jesus was the Savior, the source of eternal life.

Today, we join the Elect as they scrutinize their lives. Together we examine and repent of our own thirst for power, prestige, or possessions. With God's grace we will uncover and heal anything that blocks the love of God from being poured out into our heats. Then we can drink deeply from the life-giving springs of grace.

Reflection: Am I spiritually dry? What do I need from God to satisfy this thirst on my journey of faith this Lent?

EVENING PRAYER

in the style of Taizé

Monday, March 20 7:00 p.m.

Prayer services in the style of Taizé have spread in popularity throughout the world in churches of all denominations. Its primary intention is to bring people together in simple, quiet, and contemplative prayer for peace and healing.

When you come to Evening Prayer, you will arrive in a dimly lit church. Once inside, your gaze will be drawn towards the illuminated altar area with its icons and many candles. The sweet aroma of incense reminds us that our prayers are lifted heavenward.

Lent is a perfect time to experience this beautiful prayer. Please come and bring a friend. There is no need to leave behind your worries or your troubles, nor should you forget the great burdens of the world. Rather, bring it all to the cross of Jesus in prayer.

ABOUT THE TAIZÉ COMMUNITY

Taizé is a small village in the Burgundy region of France, which is home to a Christian monastic community, founded during the Second World War by Brother Roger. In the founder's words, "It was essential to create a community where goodness of heart and simplicity would be at the center of everything." The Taizé community is made up of more than 100 brothers from Catholic and Protestant backgrounds; they come from more than 25 countries.

Life at Taizé revolves around prayer, work, and hospitality. Since the 1960s, the hospitality has taken the form of welcoming large numbers of young adults – sometimes several thousand at a time – to stay for week-long meetings. They come to search in the light of the Gospel for meaning in their lives, though prayer, faith sharing, and practical work. At the heart of these weekly meetings is prayer with the Community three times a day.

THE SONGS OF TAIZÉ

The prayer at Taizé is almost entirely sung, except for scripture readings and very short spoken prayers and blessings. The songs of Taizé are meant to help people take time in God's presence. Those who have experienced prayer in the style of Taizé often speak of being struck both by the beauty of the prayer and the ease with which all present take part.

All of the songs of Taizé have one feature in common: they are composed of short texts that are repeated many times. This repetition is closely allied to the meditative character of the prayer. The texts are

chosen with care: a few words taken directly from the Bible or inspired by a central theme of the Gospel. The meaning of each song can be quickly grasped by the mind, and then little by little take root in the heart as it is repeated. This reflects the ancient tradition of repeated short prayers, such as the Jesus prayer of the Orthodox tradition, or the Rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet in the west.

THE POPES AND TAIZÉ

Popes over the past 60 years have spoken highly of the Taizé community and its work.

In 1986, Pope Saint John Paul II visited the Taizé community and said: "Like you, pilgrims and friends of the community, the pope is only passing through. But one passes through Taizé as one passes close to a spring of water. The traveler stops, quenches his thirst and continues on his way."

Pope Benedict XVI addressed those attending the 2012 Taizé Meeting in Rome: "Like silence, singing has an important place in your community prayers. In these days, the songs of Taizé are filling the basilicas of Rome. Singing is a support and an incomparable expression of prayer. In singing to Christ, you also open yourselves to the mystery of his hope."

In his 2013 meeting with Brother Alois, the prior of Taizé, Pope Francis expressed the deep respect he felt towards Brother Roger, the founder of Taizé, and strongly encouraged the community to continue on the road on which it is engaged.
