PENTECOST

May 19/20, 2018

The Feast of Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit, is a great festival full of traditions, images and music. Pentecost brings the Easter season to a grand and fiery close. In his masterful work, *The Church's Year of Grace*, the renowned liturgist Pius Parsch carried on at length about Pentecost and its relationship with Easter:



"At Easter, Christ, the divine Sun, rose in splendor; it is high noon at Pentecost and he sheds upon his vineyard the bright, warm rays that redden and ripen. Another comparison: At Easter the garden of the church is abloom with beautiful blossoms, Christians newly baptized and confirmed. By Pentecost, these blossoms have developed and have matured into fruit and now hang heavily upon the trees. The Gardener who tends the trees is our Savior, Jesus Christ; the sun that ripens the fruit is the Holy Ghost. And a third comparison: At Easter we are born anew as children of God. Like infants we sought our Mother's nourishing milk, the holy eucharist; carefree and happy we grew up in our Father's house. As we became older, Mother Church warned us that the happy time of childhood would pass. She taught us we were strangers and pilgrims on this earth, that we must suffer and be patient. Now at Pentecost, we have come of age."

While some of these metaphors may seem outdated, the same kind of thoughts can delight us as we prepare for the celebration of Pentecost.

Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday are intimately related, and we are living and breathing this dynamic of water and spirit. This is far more than commemorating a historic event in first century Jerusalem, far more than throwing a birthday party for the Church. It is a day for *being* Jerusalem, *being* Church; for praising the Sun of justice, the Gardener, and the Mother. It is a day for letting our human affections be shaped by the experience of completing Easter in full heart and voice.

As part of the Universal Church and to acknowledge our unity in the Holy Spirit, all of us are encouraged to wear 'red' to Mass on the weekend of May 19/20.

Thank you to the 210 families who have pledged a total of **\$79,140** for our 2018 Catholic Services Appeal.

We celebrate the generosity of this community which allowed us to burn our Mortgage at our Feast Day celebration last September.

Now that we are debt free, we must begin to focus on the updates and ongoing maintenance of this beautiful building. We are in need of roof repairs; one of our boilers is having problems; we need to think about replacing the carpeting in the Gathering and Worship Space.

Any money we raise in excess of our **\$61,681** CSA assessment will stay in the parish and fund these capital improvements.

As a Parish Community, we are grateful for your support in the Catholic Services Appeal and in the upkeep of the parish facility. If you have not yet made a pledge, it is not too late. CSA Pledge Forms are on the bulletin tables or in the parish office.


Our beloved pastor, MSGR. GERALD T. RITCHIE

CELEBRATING THE MINISTRIES OF OUR LADY OF MERCY

Highlighting the ministries of Our Lady of Mercy Parish has always been a goal of both the Pastoral Council and the Stewardship Committee. SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE NEWS CARE FOR CREATION: WATER



As a gift from God, water is a vital element essential to survival; thus, everyone has a right to it. By its very nature water, cannot be treated as just another commodity among many, and it must be used rationally and in solidarity with others.

These statements are from the Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church and should guide our thoughts, prayers and especially our actions towards the availability of water for all of humanity. Unfortunately, there are currently 2.1 billion people in the world without safe drinking water at home (<u>www.worldwaterday.org</u>). Even in the United States, one percent of Americans do not have access to clean drinking water.

March 22 of every year is World Water Day. This year, Pope Francis released a short video reminding us of the importance of water (www.vaticannews.va/en/pope/news/2018-03/ pope-francis-world-water-day.html) He begins by saying, "Water is the most essential element for life and the future of humanity depends on our capacity to guard it and share it."

What does this mean for you and me? We in Erie County are fortunate to live near the shores of Lake Erie, part of the Great Lakes, the largest system of fresh surface water in the world. We depend on our lake to provide us with clean fresh water and wonderful recreational opportunities. We can act to preserve water and keep it available for all.

On the community level, The Great Lakes Restorative Initiative was launched in 2010 to accelerate efforts to protect and restore this vital natural resource. The organization targets the biggest threats to the Great Lakes ecosystem such as invasive species and nutrient runoff. The federal funding for this initiative was recently in peril, as it was proposed that the budget be slashed from \$300 million to \$30 million. However, a deal struck in Washington in March 2018, fully restored the funds. Stay aware of programs like this and let your legislators know that you support them.

On a family level, there are many things you can do to reduce your use of water and help to preserve it. Below is a list of actions for you to consider. See how many you are already accomplishing and give thanks to God for this precious resource by beginning some new actions!

- Use your dishwasher when full and use the airdry setting. Dishwashers that are Energy Star rated use less water than hand washing.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Instead compost your food waste.
- Soak pots and pans instead of letting the water run while you scrape them.
- When doing laundry, only wash full loads and/ or match the water level to the load.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you will save up to 150 gallons per month
- Even better: shorten your shower to 5 minutes, you will save 1,000 gallons per month!
- Install low flow shower heads and water faucets.
- Turn the water off while brushing your teeth.
- Reduce lawn watering by adjusting your lawn mower to 2 inches. Taller grass shades roots and holds moisture. Also, leave lawn clippings on the grass to hold moisture.
- Use a broom instead of a hose to clean sidewalks and driveways.
- Protect the quality of our water by using fewer plastics. Two easy ways:
 - Refuse plastic shopping bags bring your reusable bag.
 - Use your own reusable water bottle.
- Test yourself on this home water audit calculator and challenge yourself to do better next month! (<u>https://wateruseitwisely.com/100-</u> ways-to-conserve/home-water-audit/)





JOINING OUR CATHOLIC FAMILY

Do you have questions about the Catholic faith? Have you thought about becoming a member of the Catholic Church? Would you like to explore the possibility of being baptized? Then come and join the members of the RCIA ministry. (RCIA stands for *Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults*).

Unbaptized adults or teens or those not raised in a Christian community are invited into a rich and powerful ministry of prayer, faith-sharing, learning and reflection. This one-year (or longer if desired) process allows participants to explore the teachings, practices and communal life of the Catholic Church so that individuals can make an honest decision about their faith journey. Because this process requires a full year, those considering baptism or acceptance into the Catholic Church next Easter would need to begin the process now.

Individuals raised and well-formed in a Christian denomination other than the Catholic Church are invited to explore the Catholic tradition and beliefs in a time-frame and context that best meets their needs. Full reception into the Catholic Church for those baptized and steeped in the Christian faith can take place when the individual and faith community discerns is appropriate.

Baptized adults who wish to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation may also pursue the formation appropriate for this sacrament. Our Lady of Mercy will celebrate Confirmation in Sunday, October 28, 2018.

25th ANNUAL GOLF & SPORTS RAFFLE

The Knights of Our Lady of Mercy held their 25th consecutive raffle on May 11. Over the years it has become one of the area's largest events of its kind, attracting 600 attendees. The proceeds from the raffle are donated back to our parish and community with over \$180,000 having been donated to date. Parish donations support youth programs, provide scholarships for high school seniors and fund capital projects.

Community donations include the Ella Cochran Food Pantry, needy families at Christmas, the Gertrude Barber Center and local athletic team whom we sponsor. The Knights would like to thank all of you – parish and non-parish members alike - who support and promote this event by buying and selling tickets and helping out before and during the raffle.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Our Lady of Mercy provides Children's Liturgy of the Word (CLW) for our young parish members, between the ages of 4 and 7 years of age. CLW is offered during the 11:00 Sunday Mass year round.

At the beginning of Mass, children are invited forward for a special blessing before leaving the sanctuary with a trained CLW leader. While the older members of the community listen to and reflect on the Word of God, our young people do the same. They process to the classroom area where they hear the Sunday readings from a Children's Lectionary. The



readings are explained in a way that relates to their young lives. Like the adults, they pray a Creed in simplified language and offer their Prayers of the Faithful. The children return to their families in time for the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

The Children's Liturgy of the Word Ministry is in need of new leaders. Several recent retirements from this ministry has left us with a tight schedule. The goal is to have 6 trained leaders who will rotate through a schedule that would assign a leader to no more than one Sunday per month.

If you enjoy working with young children but can not make the weekly commitment of a classroom catechist, this might be a perfect ministry for you. All CLW leaders must present the parish with current child abuse clearances before they can work with the children. All CLW leaders receive training for the ministry.

OREMUS: A Catholic Study on Prayer

We know we should pray. We want to pray. But often we don't know how to start or where to go. Our prayer is empty. Distractions and life's demands pull us away from prayer. So, we pray half-heartedly, sporadically, tiredly. **Oremus** is a multi-week study for those who want to pray better, both those who are not sure they know how to pray and those who have been praying for many years and want to deepen or enrich that life of prayer. Learn new ways to pray, how to hear God when you pray, how to handle times of struggle in prayer and more.

This is an 8-week program. Each week will include a video presentation and facilitated conversation on one aspect of prayer. A workbook is available for \$15, but is not required to participate.



The session will be offered twice (if there is an interest) Thursday mornings from 9:15 — 10:15 a.m. and Thursday evenings from 6:30—7:30 a.m.

Of the thousands of canonized saints in the Catholic Church, only 35 have been named "Doctors of the Church", recognized as exemplar teachers of the faith. Of these 35 Doctors of the Church, only 4 are women, all receiving that title in the last 50 years. Unlike their male counterparts, these women did not have the opportunity to study at the finest universities of their day, did not hold Church office or even have access to great libraries. Yet their faith, prayer and cooperation with the Holy Spirit overcame all restrictions for women of their day enabling them to emerge as extra ordinary, if accidental theologians, whose words continue to instruct and inspire. Over 4 weeks we will look at the lives and teachings of St. Hildegard of Bingen, St. Catherine of Siena, St. Teresa of Avila and St. Therese of Lisieux. What might these holy and creative women have to teach holy and creative women of our day?
