



THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION MT 2:1-12



"We...have come to do him homage."

These astrologers from Persia had studied the heavens for years. They were educated and wise enough to recognize that there was still much they did not know. For instance, what was the meaning of this star they had been following? What was its purpose? To find the answer they had traveled a great distance posing questions, seeking light.

They did not hesitate to ask others. This was not a secret mission. They wanted truth. What they received from the overly guarded and cautious Herod was an introduction to Scripture, to the words of the prophet Micah (5:1).

This Scripture led them to Bethlehem where they found the child and did him homage. Homage implies humility, in this case the ability to recognize someone greater than oneself. They did this through their veneration and offering of precious gifts.

The Magi received gifts as well. They returned home with new knowledge and understanding. By their openness and humility they had allowed the Prince of Peace to reveal himself to each of them.

Such openness and humility are qualities we need if the Light of Christ is to touch our hearts and minds.

For Reflection: When has a personal search for answers resulted in receiving the gift of humility? Does humility feel like a gift to me?

CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE ENVIRONMENTS

January is Human Trafficking Prevention Month Trafficking of youth is a form of modern slavery. It includes both sex trafficking and forced labor. Any child under age 18 engaged in commercial sex is a victim of sex trafficking, even if the youth's participation is not forced or coerced. Be aware of recruiting tactics. Traffickers target victims through social media sites, telephone chat lines, afterschool programs, at shopping malls, bus depots, clubs/bars or through friends and acquaintances. To help protect your child, ask questions about your child's friends, monitor their computer use and know where he/she hangs out. Food Pantry News

Thank you for your generous donations of food and money throughout the year and especially during the holidays. Your generosity is overwhelming, a sure sign of God's love active in our world. Because of this, our expenses are down and we are serving more people. We have 160 families registered and we give out at least 40 pounds of food each month. In December, we handed out a bag of personal and paper supplies.

Since most of the food given out at the food pantry contains gluten or does not specify gluten free (even tuna fish) this family cannot accept all the food and has to buy much of their own food. They can accept the meat we give out but we do not get enough donations of gluten free items. If you can help, please do.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

New Year's Resolution.

The Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has identified seven major themes that permeate the call of Christ to social justice. Consider basing your New Year's resolutions on one or more of these themes.

- 1. Life and Dignity of the Human Person. Every person is precious; people are more important than things; the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the human person.
- 2. Call to Family, Community, and Participation. People have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and wellbeing of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.
- 3. Rights and Responsibilities. Every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency.
- 4. The Poor and Vulnerable. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.
- 5. The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected--the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.
- 6. Solidarity. At the core of the virtue of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace. Pope Paul VI taught that if you want peace, work for justice. The Gospel calls us to be peacemakers.
- 7. Care for God's Creation. "Care for the earth" is not just an Earth Day slogan, it is a requirement of our faith.

May you have a happy and blessed New Year and may your resolutions help the community of Our Lady of Mercy answer the call of Christ to build his kingdom.
