





SPECIAL COLLECTION'S UPDATE



THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION

JOHN 17:1-11A

"I pray for them."

This passage from the Gospel of John is the beginning of the "high priestly prayer" offered by Jesus at the Last Supper. It is a prayer of petition made directly



to God the Father in the intimate presence of the apostles. Its words express the deep tenderness and love Jesus felt for those closest to him.

In the early verses of this text, Jesus prays that the Father will glorify him as he has glorified the Father by fulfilling his mission. Then he prayers for his followers - those with him that night and future disciples - who will continue that same mission in the world.

His words "I pray for them" are both frightening and comforting. The statement is frightening in the sense that Jesus knows the difficulties his disciples will face and recognizes we will need his help. As his disciples, we live in a world that is often hostile to Christianity.

More powerful, however, is the comfort and confidence that we can feel as we continue his mission of proclaiming God's offer of salvation. By praying for us, Jesus unites us to himself, and protects us by his love and concern. Fulfilling his mission will not be easy, but in Christ we are already successful.

Reflection: Can I imagine Jesus himself praying for me? For my family, my parish community? How can his prayer strengthen me as a disciple?

SOCIAL JUSTICE

The current pandemic has brought educational inequality into sharp relief. According to

UNESCO, the pandemic has forced school closures in 191 countries, affecting at least 1.5 billion students and 63 million primary and secondary teachers. With most of the world's students now at home due to COVID-19, the pandemic is revealing startling divides in digitally-based distance learning, data from the UN education and cultural agency, UNESCO, and partners has revealed. They found that half of all students currently out of the classroom – or nearly 830 million learners globally – do not have access to a computer. Additionally, more than 40 per cent have no Internet access at home. Disparities in distance education are particularly evident in low-income countries. Nearly 90 per cent of students in sub-Saharan Africa do not have household computers while 82 per cent are unable to get online.

In the United States, about 17 percent of students nationwide lack a computer at home, according to a 2019 analysis by the Associated Press. Eighteen percent lack broadband internet access. Low-income families and families of color are especially likely to be without these resources, according to the AP. Rural and low income urban communities are particularly disadvantaged in the switch to distance learning. In Wyoming, for example, just under 3 percent of students lack internet, and about 14 percent lack broadband, according to Education Department statistics gathered in 2017 and analyzed by the AP. But in Washington, DC, 19 percent of students have no internet and 34 percent have no broadband. In Charleston, South Carolina, 4,000 of the district's 50,000 students have no internet, according to US News & World Report.

Around the country, many students lack access to a computer at home, from around 8 percent in Utah to 28 percent in DC. For low or moderate income families, if there is a computer or tablet in the home, it must be shared by all household members, a difficulty when several children are required to spend multiple hours with on-line instruction.

Access to digital instruction is not the only struggle facing low income children. Low income families are far less likely to be able to work from home than higher income families. Parents who do not speak English, know how to reach out to the teacher or who are not familiar with the technology leave children at a steep disadvantage, as does crowded homes, learning disabilities and family instability. Chronic hunger makes it difficult to learn under the best of circumstances. Each day, the National School Lunch Program serves over 30 million children, the School Breakfast Program serves over 14.7 million children and the Child and Adult Care Food Program serves over 6.1 million children, according to CNBC. With schools around the country closed, many of these children and their families are experiencing severe food insecurity, even short term malnutrition.

Amidst school closures, many fear that millions of these students will go hungry.




