



THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION



They all ate and were satisfied.



Bread and fish were fairly basic elements for a meal around Galilee, regularly accessible even for peasants. What engages us in this account of miraculous abundance is that Jesus recognized their hunger, wanted to address their need in a practical way, and used even dried fish and bread for a profound purpose. Were the people satisfied because they were use to such simple fare? At least they would have enough sustenance to stay on and listed to Jesus. Would that have satisfied them?

Or were they satisfied because of the generosity and caring that was displayed on their behalf? Were they satisfied because the food was a sign of a kingdom that nourishes even those who come unprepared?

When we consume the food that Jesus offers us - the Eucharist, the Word, and even simple signs of life and goodness - we have to be willing to pause and register that gift of sheer satisfaction, the satisfaction that comes not so much from the provisions as from the provider.

Reflection: During this week, I will consider the many ways that God satisfies my hungers. In what ways can I make room for gratitude?



CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE ENVIRONMENTS



Documentation for Safety

Working alongside the Bishop, the Office for the Protection of Children and Youth reinforces the ongoing implementation of policies and procedures that protect children. All employees, volunteers and clergy in the Diocese of Erie who work with children must undergo criminal record checks. The diocesan Policy for the Protection of Children and Youth screening guidelines and abuse prevention training programs emphasize the importance of knowing the employees and volunteers who have access to children in our schools and parishes. Parents should remain vigilant in insisting that those with access to their children have gone through an application process and obtained the required clearances and trainings before being granted access to their children. Visit https://www.eriercd.org/ childprotection/to see what documentation and training is required for those who work with children and youth in our parishes/schools/ agencies.

O God of all the nations, may those who lead us see that justice is your blessing, that truth will set us free.


Give all of us the courage to seek the nobler way, So in this land we cherish, the good will win the day.
