



THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION



"Go and tell him his fault." This is not a passage for those of us who hate confrontation. At least it tells us to keep it as private as possible, to begin with anyway. A religious sect founded on this passage would probably be known as the "busybodies." But this passage offers more than

just a stark command to be confrontational.

There is something here also that should lead us to carefully consider our responsibilities toward our spiritual siblings, even our errant ones. It seems God so desires our harmony that just two of us simply agreeing in prayer is enough to compel the hand of God. If just two of us gathering together can summon the Son of God into our company, where does two of us avoiding each other send Jesus?

Maybe those who are our sisters and brothers through baptism are actually meant to be incredibly dear to us. Maybe the way we live together (or don't live together) actually makes a difference in our personal relationship with God. What if our relationship with God is actually a family affair? Now whose turn is it to host Thanksgiving this year?

Reflection: What situations am I avoiding that need my attention? Are their repairs to be made in a relationship? Misunderstandings that need correction?






Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments

Diocesan Child Protection Policies

The Diocese of Erie, along with all other dioceses in the United States, has policies and procedures in place to address the national problem of child abuse and to aid in maintaining safe environments. The three main components of the Policy for the Protection of Children are: screening of all employees and volunteers who

work with minors, training of all youth, parents, employees and volunteers, and reporting all suspected child abuse. The diocese is committed to promptly reporting any suspected child abuse directly to ChildLine or law enforcement. The diocese requires on-going screening and training of all personnel, paid or unpaid, who have regular contact with our children and youth under the age of 18. The diocese also requires yearly safe environment training of our children, youth and parents regarding touching-safety and safe environments. Social Justice

Christians have a moral responsibility to participate in the political process to form a society in keeping with the values of the Gospel. As the United States prepares to hold a presidential election, we are challenged by our faith and by the Bishops of the United States to reflect on the issues of our time in light of the teachings of Christ. Voting is not merely a right, it is a responsibility. As baptized disciples of Christ, we are obligated to contribute to the building of the Kingdom of God by working for the common good in shaping a just society. The Bishops of the United States tell us that: In the Catholic Tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. "People in every nation enhance the social dimension of their lives by acting as committed and responsible citizens" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 220). The obligation to participate in political life is rooted in our baptismal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to bear Christian witness in all we do. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "It is necessary that all participate, each according to his position and role, in promoting the common good. This obligation is inherent in the dignity of the human person. . . . As far as possible citizens should take an active part in public life" (nos. 1913-1915). Unfortunately, politics in our country often can be a contest of powerful interests, partisan attacks, sound bites, and media hype. The Church calls for a different kind of political engagement: one shaped by the moral convictions of well-formed consciences and focused on the dignity of every human being, the pursuit of the common good, and the protection of the weak and the vulnerable. As Pope Francis reminds us, "Politics, though often denigrated, remains a lofty vocation and one of the highest forms of charity, inasmuch as it seeks the common good. . . . I beg the Lord to grant us more politicians who are genuinely disturbed by the

state of society, the people, the lives of the poor!" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 205). The Catholic call to faithful citizenship affirms the importance of political participation and insists that public service is a worthy vocation. As citizens, we should be guided more by our moral convictions than by our attachment to a political party or interest group. When necessary, our participation should help transform the party to which we belong; we should not let the party transform us in such a way that we neglect or deny fundamental moral truths or approve intrinsically evil acts. We are called to bring together our principles and our political choices, our values and our votes, to help build a civilization of truth and love. As the Holy Father also taught in *Deus Caritas Est*, "The direct duty to work for a just ordering of society is proper to the lay faithful" (no. 29). This duty is more critical than ever in today's political environment, where Catholics may feel politically disenfranchised, sensing that no party and too few candidates fully share the Church's comprehensive commitment to the life and dignity of every human being from conception to natural death. Yet this is not a time for retreat or discouragement; rather, it is a time for renewed engagement. Forming their consciences in accord with Catholic teaching, Catholic lay women and men can become actively involved: running for office; working within political parties; communicating their concerns and positions to elected officials; and joining diocesan social mission or advocacy networks, state Catholic conference initiatives, community organizations, and other efforts to apply authentic moral teaching in the public square. Even those who cannot vote have the right to have their voices heard on issues that affect their lives and the common good. SILVER LINING STORY #1

A parishioner lost the job he had for almost thirty years due to the pandemic. He had seen the writing on the wall for quite a few years, surviving two rounds of layoffs in the past six years. As he opened up his heart and honestly looked at the situation, he had not been happy at this job for quite some time. He stayed there

because it allotted him a good salary and benefit package. He prayed that he would be able to retire from there someday but was willing to be led where God wanted him to go. Every day he would come home from that job feeling unsatisfied and unappreciated but still couldn't imagine working anywhere else, especially after spending most of his adult life there.

GOD answered his prayer. His worst fear came true. He was let go from this company. Looking back, it's obvious that God was doing for him what he couldn't do for himself. You see, he never would have left of his own accord and would have stayed there suffering until he retired. His wife knew he wasn't happy and was relieved when he came home and said that he had lost his job. She knew his abilities and skills and was confident something better would come along. She kept telling him it would be ok and GOD had better plans for him. He soon came to believe, knowing that she was right.

His confidence grew by leaps and bounds as companies reached out to him. He wasn't sure where he was going to end up but he knew GOD did. If he trusted and followed the path that was laid out for him it would work out better than he could imagine. He made random contact with a parishioner who happened to be looking for someone with his skills. He interviewed for the position and submitted a resume. He was hired a few weeks later. The lesson he learned was to Trust in GOD, knowing GOD was always working for him even when he didn't know it himself.

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
