





THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION

MATTHEW 18:21-358



Isn't it strange how so much pain and tragedy in the world seems to boil down to lack of forgiveness? Either people are unable to forgive others or they feel guilty and unforgiven themselves.

In today's gospel Peter asks Jesus how many times he must forgive someone who wrongs him. Surely Jesus' answer, "seventy times seven times," is completely unrealistic.

Often we label Jesus' teachings unrealistic out of fear. In this case we are afraid to forgive. We're afraid we'll become vulnerable; we're afraid of what will replace our familiar outrage at being wronged by another; we're afraid we'll seem weak.

But the truth is, we are weak. The secret to forgiving others is to be honest enough to admit that we are on the same footing with every other child of God. Sometimes we do good; at other times our attitudes and actions hurt others. When we think about how often we ourselves need to be forgiven, we realize that we really have no right to judge, punish, or absolve anyone.

Forgiving becomes easier once we experience the peace that comes from letting go of resentment and blame. Hateful and negative thoughts use up our energy; peaceful thoughts replenish it.

Reflection: Who is God calling me to forgive? Whose forgiveness do I need to seek?

Social Justice

Christians have a moral responsibility to participate in the political process to form a society in keeping with the values of the Gospel. As the United States prepares to hold a presidential election,

we are challenged by our faith and by the Bishops of the United States to reflect on the issues of our time in light of the teachings of Christ. Voting is not merely a right, it is a responsibility. As baptized disciples of Christ, we are obligated to contribute to the building of the Kingdom of God by working for the common good in shaping a just society. The Bishops of the United States tell us that: "In the Catholic Tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. "People in every nation enhance the social dimension of their lives by acting as committed and responsible citizens" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 220). The obligation to participate in political life is rooted in our baptismal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to bear Christian witness in all we do. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "It is necessary that all participate, each according to his position and role, in promoting the common good. This obligation is inherent in the dignity of the human person. . . . As far as possible citizens should take an active part in public life" (nos. 1913-1915). Unfortunately, politics in our country often can be a contest of powerful interests, partisan attacks, sound bites, and media hype. The Church calls for a different kind of political engagement: one shaped by the moral convictions of well-formed consciences and focused on the dignity of every human being, the pursuit of the common good, and the protection of the weak and the vulnerable. As Pope Francis reminds us, "Politics, though often denigrated, remains a lofty vocation and one of the highest forms of charity, inasmuch as it seeks the common Bishops good. . . . I beg the Lord to grant us more politicians who

are genuinely disturbed by the state of society, the people, the lives of the poor!" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 205). The Catholic call to faithful citizenship affirms the importance of political participation and insists that public service is a worthy vocation. As citizens, we should be guided more by our moral convictions than by our attachment to a political party or interest group. When necessary, our participation should help transform the party to which we belong; we should not let the party transform us in such a way that we neglect or deny fundamental moral truths or approve intrinsically evil acts. We are called to bring together our principles and our political choices, our values and our votes, to help build a civilization of truth and love. As the Holy Father also taught in Deus Caritas Est, "The direct duty to work for a just ordering of society is proper to the lay faithful" (no. 29). This duty is more critical than ever in today's political environment, where Catholics may feel politically disenfranchised, sensing that no party and too few candidates fully share the Church's comprehensive commitment to the life and dignity of every human being from conception to natural death. Yet this is not a time for retreat or discouragement; rather, it is a time for renewed engagement. Forming their consciences in accord with Catholic teaching, Catholic lay women and men can become actively involved: running for office; working within political parties; communicating their concerns and positions to elected officials; and joining diocesan social mission or advocacy networks, state Catholic conference initiatives, community organizations, and other efforts to apply authentic moral teaching in the public square. Even those who cannot vote have the right to have their voices heard on issues that affect their lives and the common good.
