

THIS SUNDAY'S REFLECTION

LUKE 9:28-36



While he was praying his face changed in appearance and his clothing became dazzling white.

I work in the downtown business section of the city. It is not unusual for me to be approached by street people, begging for money. My general response is "What is it that you need?" On a particular morning as I was praying to the Lord, I asked him to show himself to me in a different way that day. I was approached by a man on that day and he begged for money. For some reason I responded differently. I asked him how much he needed. His answer was "everything that you have!" As I gave him all the money in my billfold, he thanked me and walked away. Normally I do not look back at beggars, but this time I chanced it and as I did, the man became engulfed in the later afternoon sun, which made his retreating appearance dazzling.

Jesus too became dazzling, allowing himself to be known as the "Christ" to Peter, John and James. He intended for them to see him differently than they did on other days when they were together.

We can become so familiar that Jesus' presence is overshadowed by everyday happenings. But God's love gives us many opportunities to witness a transfiguration.

Reflection: How can I become more attentive to the dazzling presence of God in the midst of my everyday routine?



THE LITURGICAL ENVIRONMENT OF LENT

Of the many ministries needed for effective liturgy, perhaps the most visible but least understood is the ministry of liturgical environment. It includes the treatment of all the visible elements within and around a liturgy. It's about how the look and the feel of the space supports the liturgy of the particular day and liturgical season. Did you feel that the OLM Christmas environment was regal? Did the white, gold and silver colors of hangings and flowers balance the deep green of trees and wreaths in a manner fit for a king? Did the flickering candles and tiny lights and crystals give you a sense of the

celebration of the "light of Christ?" Members of the environment ministry hope

By contrast, this Lent we see an environment that is simple, even stark: a bare tree, a banner of purple, a mostly unadorned space. This is not by chance. Lent calls us into a time of reflection, a looking inward. The environment signals this by removing decorations and distractions and—we hope— creates a quiet, reflective mood. This emptiness, this openness, is meant to help us enter into silence and reflection.

Lent is meant to be reflective because, since its inception, it has been about preparing for Baptism, the

sacrament that welcomes us as a People of God. For those already baptized, it is the time for a spiritual checkup; a time to ask ourselves how our journey as a follower of Christ is going. Are we living a life that reflects the values of Jesus? The tradition of fasting, prayer, and giving to the poor during this time, allows us to strip away non -essentials—just as our liturgical environment does—to focus on living a more Christ-like life. Simple as they may be, the few elements of the Lenten liturgical environment are meant to assist

us in this reflection. What does the special attention given to the baptismal font mean to you? Less tangible, how does the purple banner affect you? What feelings does it recall? And how do you respond to the bare tree? Did you wonder if it has buds yet? Does the bird in its upper branches help you connect this tree to the creation outside your window? Each person may find unique meanings and feelings associated with these elements. History gives us examples of how previous ages responded to these same elements.

In the first century, the color purple was made

from a dye that was both rare and expensive. Only royalty could afford it and so Christ, the king. Further, the sacrifice of Christ. The tree. of creation, reminded them "Behold the wood of the cross," shows how the early

it became a symbol of kingship. Christians saw in this meaning a reference to purple-red hue reminded believers of the bloody aside from being a reminder of the cycle of life, blooming in the spring, dying in the fall. The traditional phrase, church honored the wood of the cross on which Jesus died. For them and for us. this tree foreshadows the historical events of Holy Week.

In the coming weeks, take time to soak in the images and feelings of Lent. Allow the images and feelings to guide you in a reflection on your life, your goals and your experience of Christ. This Lent, make an uncluttered space for quiet and make time to rest in the Lord.
