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The season of Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2022 and concludes when the Paschal Triduum of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of the Lord begins at the start of the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, April 14, 2022.

The following practices and regulations are promulgated and binding for all Latin Rite Catholics in the Diocese of Erie for Lent and the Paschal Triduum, 2022.

1. Traditional Lenten practices of PRAYER, FASTING, and ALSMGIVING and other forms of self-denial are recommended most warmly by the Church. Daily Mass is particularly encouraged.

2. ASH WEDNESDAY, ALL FRIDAYS IN LENT, and GOOD FRIDAY are days of <u>abstinence</u> from meat for those 14 years of age and older. In 2022, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord (March 25) falls on a Friday of Lent. Thus, abstinence from meat is not mandatory on Friday, March 25, 2022.

3. ASH WEDNESDAY AND GOOD FRIDAY are also days of <u>fasting</u> for those ages 18 to 58 inclusive. On these days, those bound by the law of fasting may take one full meal. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength according to one's needs, are also permitted. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or work is seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

The Cross and the Word-made-flesh: the Human Christ in Early Medieval Preaching

This talk explores the way Christ's human birth, suffering, and death were presented to ordinary people through preaching during the era of intense controversy over the Incarnation, the doctrine that Christ is the Word of God made flesh. In a time before crucifixes, Christ's suffering was not taken for granted, yet the importance of the cross as a symbol for worshippers in this period shows just how central his suffering was, and the need for contemporary preachers to properly explain it.

Tiggy McLaughlin has a PhD in History from the University of Michigan and currently teaches in the History and Theology Departments at Gannon University, where she teachers introductory courses as well as upper-level courses on the History of Witchcraft and Ancient Christianity. She is currently working on a book that examines the role ordinary peoples' associations with flesh played in Christological developments in sixth-century Gaul.

PARENT BAPTISMAL PREPARATION SESSION

Are you expecting to welcome a baby into your family? Was your home recently blessed with the birth of a child? Would you like to bring this child into the faith family of the Church? Would you like to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism with your child?

The next Parent Baptismal Preparation Session will be held on March 27 @ noon here at Our Lady of Mercy.

Since babies are unable to prepare for this Sacrament, can not make their commitment to the faith, parents who desire the baptism of a child are asked to prepare as they bring their child to the font. It is a policy of the Diocese

of Erie that a parent seeking Baptism for a child must attend a Parent Baptismal Prep Session within two years of celebrating the Sacrament. Parents may attend a session at any Catholic parish. Our Lady of Mercy holds these sessions semi-annually. The next session will be held in the fall. Families are asked to register prior to attending so that ample materials will be available. Father James DiLuzio is an ordained Roman Catholic priest, fully professed member of the Missionary Society of Saint Paul the Apostle since 1993. He has served as an associate pastor in parishes in Los Angeles, and Minneapolis-Saint Paul. Since 2004 he has worked primarily as a Paulist Missionary, visiting Catholic parishes in the USA- some in sister relationships with local Episcopal and Methodist churches -a week at a time, offering missions and retreats on a variety of topics: The Gospel of Luke (www.LukeLive.com). **Resurrection Faith (and What It** Means to Us on a Daily Basis), and The Story of Saint Paul the Apostle (See http://www.lukelive.com/ additional-offeringsmission-topics/ #resurrection).

Throughout his missionary years, Fr. DiLuzio has painstakingly infused all his presentations with the Paulist Fathers' charism of respect for peoples of all faith traditions (and those with a secular outlook) in this great American experiment. I thought we would be back to normal by now; pandemic over, safe to travel, sitting close to people. Now in this second year of caution, masking, distancing, and upheaval – I realize there is probably no going "back to normal" but only going to "the New Different."

It is natural to look at things in terms of what I have lost in my ministry and personal life. Yet this particular line of sight only brought discouragement and depression.

Mystics seem to have a different way of viewing life experiences. Julian of Norwich gave us the saying: "And all shall be well. And all shall be well. And all manner of things shall be exceedingly well." (Revelations of Divine Love)

I started looking at this life experience through the wisdom of what I have gained. Not the confusion and fear of an unknown future but what I have learned about myself. Not a loss of hope but the deepening of my relationship with God. I have spent the time from reduced activity to pursue creativity; cooking with natural ingredients, pulling out the recipe for "doorstop bread," researching the healing properties of herbs, experimenting with new scents for handmade soap, spending more time in prayer, and reading spiritual books. These last two summers have yielded a bountiful harvest from the most weed-free garden we have ever had.

The feeling of loss gave way to a sense of "being available for whatever was needed in the moment." Realizing again the gift of walking with someone on their faith journey; providing spiritual direction for people seeking a fuller sense of God in their life. Although I did not seek to learn about my shortcomings, I had opportunities to learn again that I do not control others, but I can control what I say, think and do.

I found myself asking; Am I moving toward love and compassion through my thoughts, words, and actions in this moment or am I moving away from love, away from God? And I learned that I can change my thoughts, words or actions in the next moment.

My human instinct wants to know now that my future is secure, but I cannot see into the future to find that kind of security. In these last two years, there have been moments that I experienced, at least for an instant, the fullness of God and know all will be well, even though I cannot know all the details. Then the instant passes. The mystic in me is learning how to live from instant to instant.

CHARITY – YOUR KNIGHTS IN ACTION

At the time of Thanksgiving and Christmas, we were called to be generous and donated to the Harborcreek Food Pantry and a special family of the parish.

Also, due to the recent tornado destruction in the South, the Kentucky Knights of Columbus State Council coordinated fundraising for The Kentucky Tornado Relief Fund to which Our Lady of Mercy Council generously donated \$1,640 - \$250 by the council and \$1,390 by individual Knights.

An i-Camera was purchased and donated to Harborcreek Township for use at public events.

PRO-LIFE

The recent *Pennsylvania March for Life* was a huge success with over 6,000 attendees; Knights and families were there in number. With the possibility of legal abortion ending (repeal of Roe v Wade), there is great interest and activity in the area of pro-life.

Our council, along with St. Gregory's and others continue the relationship with local and surrounding Women Care Centers and providing them with new ultrasound machines. The value of the ultrasound is that many women choose life when they are able to see their baby moving. In keeping with that, they have a need for a portable unit which could be taken to various locations – one being a college. Since the cost is approximately \$250,000, thirty councils will raise funds in many ways for this all-encompassing project.

In the Spirit of Fr. Sperry

John Abbate turned in a 2003 St. Joseph Home newsletter which contained an uplifting story written by Fr. James E. Sperry, reprinted here without the original photo. Fr. Sperry served as pastor of Our Lady of Mercy from 1961 to 1990.

My Famous, and Infamous, Chevy

You had to be at the Home in the 1940's to have encountered my infamous Chevy. When I was ordained. I couldn't afford a new car but a couple of years later I picked up this vintage Chevrolet (Class of '34) that you can see in the accompanying picture. (Substituted picture. The original picture had a young man in a navy uniform standing next to it.) It's at rest there with my cousin aboard. But that's the rub! It rested better than it ran! I presume we used it to get to games, but it was always precarious! I am sure a good many of you took your turn at pushing – perhaps to get it started or to the curb, in the midst of traffic. It was just a lousy car!

Still, like the donkey on Palm Sunday, it had its day! I really believe this little old Chevy belongs in the Guinness Book of Records. Can you believe that it once held 17 passengers? Look again at the picture. Impossible? I don't think my memory fails me. It was a day for the beach and apparently the bus was unavailable, so the Chevy became our "bus". We stashed five in the trunk, seven in the back seat, and five in the front. We got to the beach

alright but coming back – with the hill ahead of us – the car simply said "NO." Doors opened and the 16 got out. Alone in the car, I and the Chevy climbed the hill, I presume, as much by manpower as by horsepower. Doors opened, all climbed in, and we continued our journey home without further complication.

But my Chevy returned to its infamous ways. One day, late in '48, it conked out on me on the way home from school. I pulled to the curb by the Erie Day School, walked home, called a garage to pick it up, and never saw my famous, infamous Chevy again. Still, I suppose it had one advantage over my finicky Fraser and cranky Kaiser – it was easy to push!
