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Meet Fr. Matt



There is an old saying, "When God closes a door, God opens a window." This summer, when Fr. Ritchie died, it felt as if a door slammed shut, breaking our hearts in the process. Three months later, God has opened wide the doors to welcome Fr. Matthew Kujawinski into our community as our pastor, our priest, the newest member of our parish family.

Fr. Matt grew up in Erie on 13th and Wallace as the middle child of three boys. His family has been members of St. Stan parish for many years. He began his Catholic education at St. Stan parish school. He continued his studies at Cathedral Prep High School, Gannon Univ. and completed his work at St. Vincent Seminary.

Fr. Matt was ordained as a priest of the Diocese of Erie in 2003. He has served in parishes around the diocese, from Our Lady of Peace in Erie to Immaculate Heart of Mary in Mercer. For the past four years, he has also worked as the Administrator of the Office of Divine Worship in addition to serving in the parish.

This past July, Fr. Matt was named pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish. So it was a shock when he received word from Bishop Persico that he was being called to be pastor of Our Lady of Mercy Parish. He considers it an honor and a privilege to serve in a parish known for its faith and deep sense of community.

Fr. Kujawinski balances his commitment to ministry with time for

personal relaxation. He enjoys reading, especially mysteries. Going to the movies is something else he likes to do in his free time. Traveling to visit friends or to Disney World allows him to step away from the demands of ministry for a few days. Four years ago, Mel entered his life. Anyone with a dog knows the pleasure our pets can bring.

Before he even moved in, the staff knew that Fr. Matt loves Christmas. He is able to look beneath all the commercialism to recognize and celebrate the beauty of the season. God became human and invited us into the Divine life of peace, joy and good will toward all. Fr. Matt is filled with gratitude for the gift that God has given and rejoices in the ability to give gifts to others in turn.

God has always been an important part of Fr. Matt's life. He has never resonated with the claim of being spiritual without being religious. The Church has played a central role in his spiritual growth. The community of believers is essential for him.

Some of his most powerful spiritual moments have been celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation with people. It is often here that people are most open to the love and mercy of God, most humbly seek God's goodness, most profoundly admit their total reliance on God and allow God's grace to break through.

Fr. Kujawinski has a keen sense of blessings in the ordinary moments that fill each day. Among these blessings has been all the wonderful people who have welcomed him so generously in his first three days at OLM. He is looking forward to the months and years ahead as together we journey with Christ.

His Healing Touch

Luke 17:15 –

"And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice"



Prompted by this reading and nearing a year since a major surgery I felt this note would be one way for me to give thanks and glorify God! And, perhaps it can be a piece of His work in motion to connect someone with rare disease to a resource that can help.

Beyond my own experiences, I have begun noticing God's working hand in rare disease –

Although any single rare disease impacts less than 200,000 people in the United States, in total there are 7000 rare diseases impacting 30 million in the United States and 350 million globally. Fewer than 5% of rare diseases have approved treatments.

In 2021, I learned of The Rare Initiative at Massachusetts General Hospital to find cures that can be leveraged across rare diseases. In an airport this September, I noticed a billboard for Oxford-Harrington Rare Disease Centre. This newly formed center is working to drive cutting-edge rare disease breakthroughs to address the unmet need in rare disease across the globe. So exciting to see these efforts in motion!

NORD (National Organization of Rare Disease; https://rarediseases.org/) is a website where individuals can learn more of their disease, connect with the medical teams that can best treat them and gain access to family and caregiver support.

I am writing to send you my greetings and introduce myself, my name is Fr. Javier Jesús Castillo Domínguez, on the next month of September I will celebrate 1 year as the priest of Our Lady of the Assumption in Peto.



With the grace of the Lord, on August 1^{st} I celebrated 22 years of Priestly Ordination and on the 6th of the same month was my 57th birthday.

I had previously heard of the Sister Parish Program, although this is the first time I get in contact with you, for which I feel very grateful, because starting a relationship of friendship and fellowship with the sisters and brothers of Our Lady of Mercy, is a great blessing.

The community of Peto is large. The Parish (town) population is approximate 25,000 people and this has 15 communities for its pastoral care, the extra 15 communities add another 5,000 people. I heard that a group Our Lady of Mercy were here in 2019 to meet and interact with this community. As it was at that occasion, it would be a great pleasure for us when someone wants to come visits us again.

As in the whole world, the pandemic hit us quite hard because the closure of the churches made pastoral action very difficult. There were several deaths in the community, they were even times of terror, of fear of the unknown; However, it was in those dark times that we saw the light of Christ most clearly since the solidarity on all levels allowed us to move forward.

We are currently in the process of reopening. With great difficulties, due to the fear of the people to congregate, we have just concluded the



pastoral year 2021-2022. We did so by celebrating the First Communion of 300 children and the confirmation of 159 kids throughout the Parish. They were celebrations full of faith and joy, which gave us back hope, because gathering to celebrate in the Name of the Lord taught us the way that we will return to being an Alive Church. In the remaining days of August and the first days of September, the catechism of children and adolescents will be in the registration process to begin the new pastoral course 2022-2023 that, with the grace of God, we hope will come full of blessings for all.

We hope that more than 2,000 children and 500 teens will be enrolled throughout the parish in all grades. It has taken us much work to reactivate youth and family ministry. May God gives us strength to keep trying.



On the other hand, groups such as the Legion of Mary (especially of ladies), the men's nocturnal adoration, and the Charismatic Marian Team, undoubtedly with their prayer help us in the parish walk.

After these years of pandemic little by little life returns to our Church, the spiritual life, the life of community prayer is in full awakening and with the help of God the Parish of Our Lady of the Assumption will once again be the point of reference of our community. However, we have a



great concern because in 2019 we tried to restore the main altarpiece of the Church, this restoration has to start from the waterproofing of the roof and then the intervention of a specialist in the wood of the altarpiece. It is a great challenge but at the same time a great project, which with God's help and through his people we can carry out.

Dear brothers in very general terms this is what we have in our community, and we want to share it with you, because the sharing of our daily work is also sharing the faith.

We ask God the Good Father that we may strengthen the bonds of friendship, and that as we pray for one another, we may be filled with grace and blessing.


The Knights joined the parish and the community in mourning the passing of Father Ritchie, who served Our Lady of Mercy for 32 years.

what Is Liturgy?

What is liturgy? One simple answer is that it is the Eucharist, the Mass, that we celebrate every Sunday. But liturgy is more than Mass. It includes the Sacraments, Morning and Evening prayer— what the Church calls the Liturgy of the Hours— and more. So, how do we recognize liturgy and distinguish it from other prayers and devotions?

The ancient church called liturgy, "the work of the people" stemming from an understanding of

a corporate work, like building an amphitheater, something that was done as a community. How do you see our Sunday liturgy? What is the work being done and who is doing it?

For a moment, think about what happens in the first half of a Sunday Mass. We gather. We sing a song. We say the Sign of the Cross together. The presider proclaims an opening prayer. Then the lector proclaims an Old Testament Scripture; we sing a psalm; the lector reads a New Testament Scripture. We sing an

alleluia; the priest or deacon proclaims the Gospel; A homily is given and the words of Scripture are broken open for us.

Gabe Huck, a noted liturgical writer, once said that three related elements describe liturgy: Ritual, Prayer, and Community. Let's look for them in this overview of the beginning of Mass.

In Mass, we see a Ritual structure, a predictable form, repeated each week. We know it. In it are embedded prayers, such as, the Opening prayer or Collect, the Penitential Rite prayer and the Glory to God. After the homily these are followed by our common prayer of belief, the Creed, and then our prayers of intercession. When the community engages in these ritual actions by singing, praying with the presider and responding to the other

prayers, we have a liturgy, that is, a community engaged in common prayer and ritual.

But there is more to liturgy than we see at Mass. Its preparation involves many people. For instance, greeters/ushers welcome all and help those in need to access the gathering space and the worship space. These spaces are attractively prepared by an environment group for each liturgical season, e.g. Lent, Easter,

> Ordinary Time, to further welcome the community. Presiders and deacons prepare homilies and intercessions; Musicians select music appropriate to the readings and the seasons. Readers, choirs and cantors practice and prepare to proclaim their part. The familiar phrase "It takes a village" works for us as an analogy for liturgy. Liturgy requires a village: the engaged assembly, the readers, the presider, the greeters, the cantor, the environment ministers, the servers, the musicians. All are

necessary for liturgy to happen the way it is meant to.

Seeking harmony and excellence among the various ministries undertaken by the community as part of the "big picture" of liturgy, requires still others, often a liturgy committee or a liturgist who seek to coordinate these various elements as the church moves through the liturgical year.

Now, think for a moment about the last liturgy you attended. How did it go? Did you participate? What role did you assume?
