3 ENTEN PRACTICES 202



The season of Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023 and concludes when the Paschal Triduum of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of the Lord begins at the start of the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, April 6, 2023.

The following practices and regulations are promulgated and binding for all Latin Rite Catholics in the Diocese of Erie for Lent and the Paschal Triduum, 2023.

- 1. Traditional Lenten practices of PRAYER, FASTING, and ALSMGIVING and other forms of self-denial are recommended most warmly by the Church. Daily Mass is particularly encouraged.
- 2. ASH WEDNESDAY, ALL FRIDAYS IN LENT, and GOOD FRIDAY are days of <u>abstinence</u> from meat for those 14 years of age and older. In 2023, the Feast of St. Patrick (March 17) falls on a Friday of Lent. Thus, per Bishop Persico's dispensation, abstinence from meat is not mandatory on Friday, March 17, 2023.
- 3. ASH WEDNESDAY AND GOOD FRIDAY are also days of <u>fasting</u> for those ages 18 to 58 inclusive. On these days, those bound by the law of fasting may take one full meal. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength according to one's needs, are also permitted. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or work is seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Our Parish Community will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at all Masses on March 18 & 19 2023. Jesus spent the greatest amount of his time healing both spiritually and physically. It is said that we spend our time on those things which are most important to us. If this is true, then healing must have been a very important value to Jesus. Our Mission Statement reminds us that we are a community that lives the values of Jesus Christ. Our celebration is not just for the sick. The faith community gathers with them to show their concern for the sick of our community, and to pray with and for the sick of the community.

Who may celebrate this Sacrament?

Those who are suffering any serious physical or mental illness; those who are suffering any chronic illness; those who are about to undergo surgery; the elderly who cannot get around as well as before.



OPERATION RICE BOWL

Once again, this Lent, parishioners of Our Lady of Mercy are invited to participate in Operation Rice Bowl this Lent.

Operation Rice Bowl is a project sponsored by Catholic Relief Services. CRS is a Catholic developmental organization assisting the poorest and most desperate of our brothers and sisters around the world. Through Operation



Rice Bowl, we are given an opportunity to share our abundant blessings with those in need.

Rice Bowl cardboard banks and family calendars were distributed to all of the children enrolled in our Rel. Ed. Program. Additional Rice Bowls and calendars are available for families not connected with Rel. Ed.

The calendars offer excellent suggestions for keeping the needs of others before us during Lent. Information on the causes of hunger and poverty in various regions of the globe are given in a way that is easy for all to understand.

As we give up luxuries such as chocolate or eat a simple meal once a week, we are invited to place the money we save into the Rice Bowl Bank. In this way, our acts of self-sacrifice are not tests of our self-will, but opportunities to help others. The money in each bank is turned in to the Rel. Ed. Office during the Easter season. From there, it is mailed to Catholic Relief Services to help the hungry and homeless, those without access to education or medical care, around the world.

BAPTISMAL PREPARATION SESSION



LOOKING FOR WAYS TO LOWER YOUR TAXABLE INCOME?

If you are age 70-1/2 or older IRS rules require you to take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from your tax deferred retirement account.

To reduce the impact of RMD income investors may want to consider making a "Qualified Charitable Distribution" (QCD).

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from an IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. (OLM qualifies). Contributions can be excluded from your taxable income, thus reducing your tax bill.

Brandon Vogt


The National Eucharistic Revival has been described as "a time of healing". Join together in an evening of communal and reflective song and reflect upon the meaning of the Eucharist in your life.



Over the past year, I've had many opportunities to share with others, the encounters I've had with Christ throughout my life. These times of sharing inspired me to write a brief newsletter article, so share them with all of you.

In my younger years, when I heard the phrase "encounter with Christ" I pictured the skies opening up with a great big beam of light and a loud, low toned, James Earl Jones type of voice speaking from the heavens. Turns out, an encounter like that, has not been part of God's plan for me, not yet at least. My first true, life-changing encounter with Christ came to me as a young 10th grader. I had recently dropped out of my confirmation class, though I continued to attend Mass on a weekly basis. I was looking for something more spiritually, and I'm not sure I even realize it. In the midst of my spiritual chaos, I was invited to go to Harrisburg with a school group for a couple of days. The small group met at Harbor Creek High School very early in the morning, loaded up a little car with the overly packed suitcases of 4 teenaged girls, and we started the 4 hour trip to the state capital. It didn't take long before I dozed off to sleep, though I have never been a very good "car sleeper". What I didn't realize was that a very ordinary thing would

change the course of my life when I woke up. When I finally woke up from my nap, I learned we were near State College. I rubbed my sleepy eyes open, and looked out the backseat window. At that moment, through dark, morning clouds, the bright sun appeared and the sunrays connected the earth to the heavens. Though there were 4 other people in the car that morning who saw the exact same beautiful sight, I was the only one who saw it as an encounter with Christ. From that moment on,

my life was changed. Why? I believe it was because I was open to feel better, you feel safe, you feel joy). And he said "have a good having an encounter with Christ. I believe it was because, though day, and God bless you!" His words took my breath away. The I have never had a life changing encounter, I knew it could happen one day. Prior to that encounter with Christ, I was living for myself, as most teenagers do. But it was at that moment that I was transformed. The very real presence of God was made known to me, which gave me something greater to live for. I'm so thankful that our God is a forgiving one, and that perfection is not expected from us. Though this encounter changed my life, I didn't always make the best of choices. For you to understand the next encounter with Christ I'm going to talk to you about, I need to get personal for a sentence or two. I was a young single mom and though I have been blessed with amazing family and friends who I consider the best support system possible, I am essentially an only parent to my daughter, Bailey. This next encounter took place when Bailey was about 3 years old. One of our favorite things to do when Bailey was so young, was to visit the Blasco Library on the Bayfront. I had recently sprained my ankle, and relied on crutches to get around. Though it would be very convenient, life with a child does not slow down or stop due to an injured parent. So I packed up Bailey's book bag with all of the books we read the week before, and off to the library we went. It didn't take long after we went through the automatic doors for Bailey to take off towards the

Children's Library section. Though I tried to keep up, I just couldn't manage; she was too fast for me. It didn't take long for me to find her in her favorite section, skimming through all of the science books. After a brief "talking to" we filled up her backpack with dozens of new books to read over the course of the next couple of weeks. Before we headed to checkout, I wanted to look for a book to enjoy while I was laid up with a bummed ankle. Before I could tell Bailey we would be going upstairs, she jetted for the door. She couldn't wait to get home to read her new books. At that point, I ditched the crutches and hobbled along to catch up to her. After another talking to we made our way back into the library to retrieve the crutches I dropped somewhere along the way and to make the journey upstairs. Once we got the crutches, we headed over to the elevator, where Bailey threw a typical 3 year old fit because she wanted to climb the big stair case because it looked like "stairs in a castle". Though I explained to her that I couldn't climb that many stairs with my hurt ankle, she began to cry anyway. So there we were...a mom on crutches with a "Sofia The First" backpack over my shoulder, an ankle brace on my left ankle, leaning up against my crutches...and my 3 year old daughter, face covered in tears because she wanted to be like a princess by climbing the stairs...waiting for the elevator door to open up. Just like clockwork, about .5 seconds away from my breaking point, the door opened. Out of the elevator walked a disheveled

elderly man, in dirty clothes, and an overgrown beard. The dirt on his face and hands and the stains on his shirt matched the odor that hit me like a ton of bricks just mere seconds after the door opened. As he stepped out of the elevator, I stepped in (if you can even call it that) the elevator with my still crying child. Before the door shut behind us, this gentleman looked me square in the eyes, then a big smile spread across his face (the kind of smile that you see and you instantly

next thing I knew, the doors closed, and I was now crying in the elevator with my 3 year old daughter.

We made it home safe from the library that day. But once again, my life was changed. I truly believe the fateful elevator encounter I had was in fact, one with Christ himself. God made himself present to me here on earth when I needed him the most. It was later that week that I contacted the church and began the process of getting Confirmed.

Of course, like I mentioned before, both of these examples of my encounters with Christ could be mistaken as ordinary, every day life events. They became life-changing encounters with Christ because my eyes and heart were open to God's wonderful work here on earth.
